- 1) Harriet Jacobs was a slave. Harriet Jacobs wrote a slave narrative about her experience. She lived for seven years in a small crawl space.
- 2) Jacobs had a good childhood but was willed to a bad man. She watched her children grow up through a peep hole. She moved to Rochester, NY. She wrote an autobiography.

What are slave narratives?

Slave narratives are stories written by slaves about their experiences.

Describe the space where Harriet Jacobs lived for seven years:

She lived in a small crawl space. There were rats, mice, and ants. It was either cold or hot. The space was only 9 feet long, 7 feet wide, and 3 feet tall. She couldn't stand up or move around.

List five ways Jacobs was able to empower herself and gain some control in her hiding space:
